2. Legal Requirements and Documentation

Required Documentation

4. Age-Appropriate Car Seats and Restraints

Car Seat Requirements and Age Guidelines

It is crucial to understand and follow these evidence-based guidelines:

- Rear-facing seats: Required until at least one year AND 20 pounds, with recommendation to continue rear-facing until age two or more
- Forward-facing car seats: Use after outgrowing rear-facing limits
- Booster seats: Required after outgrowing forward-facing seats until the child reaches 4'9" tall
- Vehicle seat belts: Only appropriate when child reaches 4'9" tall and can properly fit the vehicle's seat belt system

Trainer Note: Emphasize that these are minimum requirements - it's always safer to extend the use of more protective restraints when possible within the seat's limits.

- Rear-facing seats for infants and toddlers (birth to 2 years)
- Forward-facing car seats (2-4 years)
- Booster seats (4-8 years or until 4'9" tall)
- Regular seat belts (when height/weight appropriate)

Installation and Usage

- Proper installation techniques for different car seat types

- Regular inspection for wear and damage
- Replacement after any accident
- Registration for recall notifications
- Professional installation check availability

5. Safe Driving Practices

Vehicle Placement and Air Bag Safety

- The center of the back seat is the safest location for child passengers
- NEVER place a rear-facing car seat in front of an active air bag
- Keep children in the back seat until at least age 13
- Always perform a five-second walk around the vehicle before entering to prevent back-over incidents

General Safety Guidelines

- Always wear seat belts and ensure children are properly restrained
- Maintain appropriate speed and following distance
- Use turn signals for all lane changes and turns
- Check mirrors frequently
- Eliminate distractions while driving

Distraction Prevention

- No cell phone use while driving
- Plan routes in advance
- Address children's needs before starting trip
- Keep emergency supplies within reach
- Use hands-free devices when necessary

Weather Considerations

- Adjust driving for weather conditions
- Maintain longer following distances in poor weather
- Keep emergency supplies for weather-related incidents
- Know alternate routes
- Check weather forecasts before long trips

6. Emergency Preparedness

Emergency Kit Contents

- First aid supplies
- Flashlight and batteries
- Blankets
- Water and non-perishable snacks
- Basic tools
- Jumper cables
- Warning devices (reflectors, flares)
- Contact information for emergency services

Emergency Procedures

- Steps to take in case of accident
- Breakdown procedures
- Medical emergency response
- Weather emergency procedures
- Communication protocols with agency

Heat Safety and Children

- Create reminders or habits to ensure no child is forgotten
